

What was the Windrush?

The name 'Windrush' derives from the 'HMT Empire Windrush' ship which brought one of the first large groups of Caribbean people to the UK in 1948.

Why did people migrate to Britain?

In 1948, Britain was starting to recover from World War 2. Thousands of buildings had been bombed and lots of houses were destroyed - it all needed to be rebuilt. After the war, thousands of Caribbean men and women answered an advert to come to Britain where there were lots of different jobs to do (including manufacturing, public transport and the NHS). Many people felt a sense of duty and were also eager to migrate to Britain because there were better job opportunities.



People were told that they would find a better way of life


Many immigrants were not given equal rights or opportunities


Many of them experienced racism and discrimination
